Between around A.D. 150-1400 the Maya constructed astronomical observatories to track solar positions. They also recorded specific events involving the sun, moon, stars, and planets on carved monuments during the Classic period (A.D. 250-900). Painted books dating to the Postclassic period (A.D. 900-1550) record the cycles of Venus, Mars, and the Moon, as well as seasonal almanacs and a zodiac depicting animal constellations
