

Gainesville based Institute in 2011 using an online wikispace, field trips and classroom lectures to connect Latin American studies and the sciences.








The institute integrated science and Latin American studies to develop appropriate technology and experiential learning lessons in the classroom.



Several participants reflected on the homestay in Golden Stream Community as an eyeopening experience that they will carry with them in their personal and professional lives. A luncheon with Belizean teachers allowed educators to express their unique challenges cross culturally and to build partnerships around their aspirations.






