○	ALPARGATAS(Shoes): -Rope soled sandals worn by the Joropos in the Plains region during fiestas.	Venezuela
○	WOVEN BAG: -Made of the <i>fique</i> fiber which is used by rural people to make many items.	Venezuela
○	SHAWL: -Women's Shawl.	Ecuador
○	PAIR OF GLOVES: -Purchased in a camping good store, represent a growing industry of knitting. -Women are paid minimal wages to make them.	Ecuador
○	BROWN HANDKERCHEIF.	Ecuador
○	WOVEN BAG WITH ZIPPER: -Made of wool.	Ecuador
○	STRAW BAG: -From the Andean Region. -Made from a tall grass found in the highlands.	Colombia
○	CLOTH ARTESANIA SHOPPING BAG.	Colombia
○	HAIR CLIP WITH A MEXICAN DOLL.	Mexico
○	2 MEXICAN BAGS.	Mexico
○	1 DOLL in YUCATEC MAYA COSTUME Doll from Mérida, Mexico, the capital of the Yucatán State	Mexico
○	HUIPIL (Dress) -Dress in the Mayan style from Mérida, A complete Yucatecan Maya Woman's outfit would include a <i>huipil</i> , a <i>justan</i> (embroidered slip longer than the dress), and a <i>rebozo</i> (shawl)	Mexico
○	WOOL VEST	Mexico
○	BOLSA DE HENEQUÉN Bag made from the Henequén fabric, the same fabric used to make Bailing twine. The Yucatan used to supply all the bailing twine for the United States until plastic rope became available.	Mexico
○	6 BOLSOS (STRAW WOVEN PURSES)	Mexico
○	STRAW POUCH FROM OAXACA	Mexico
○	2 PAIRS OF SMALL SANDALS.	Honduras

○	RED/BLACK WOOL PONCHO	Argentina
○	3 CHUMPI (LARGE) -Woven belts of various colors worn by both men and women.	Andean Countries
○	5 CHUMPI (SMALL) -Woven belts of various colors and fabrics traditional to the Andean regions of South America.	Andean Countries
○	LEATHER HAT	Brazil
○	RUBBER SHOES	Brazil
○	BEAD NECKLACE	Brazil
○	NECKLACE Made from seeds, wood, bone, and colorful bird feathers. We believe this necklace originates from the <i>Canela</i> tribe of the Amazon.	Brazil
